Congregational United Church of Christ (Middle Rd. [Rte. 65], near Collins Ave., Sayville). Shingles set in curving patterns contribute to the sense of vitality imparted by this broad-fronted and towered Shingle-style church, built in 1888 by Deacon Robert Nunns.

Suffolk County News (23 Candle Ave., just south of Main St., Sayville). Handsome Greek Revival styling distinguishes this newspaper office. Its four columns have fine carved lonic capitals.

Middle Road, Bayport. The progression of nineteenth-century Long Island architecture, from formal Greek Revival to vigorous Victorian, is on proud display along Middle Rd. and the west side of Ocean Ave. A particularly interesting example is the Edwards-Bush House (Middle Rd., near East Lane), built in the 1850's by a sea captain who brought the wood for three houses from Barbados. Fluted columns with unfolding acanthus leaves support a bracketed pediment Italianate flourish to second-store windows have old stained etched glass.
