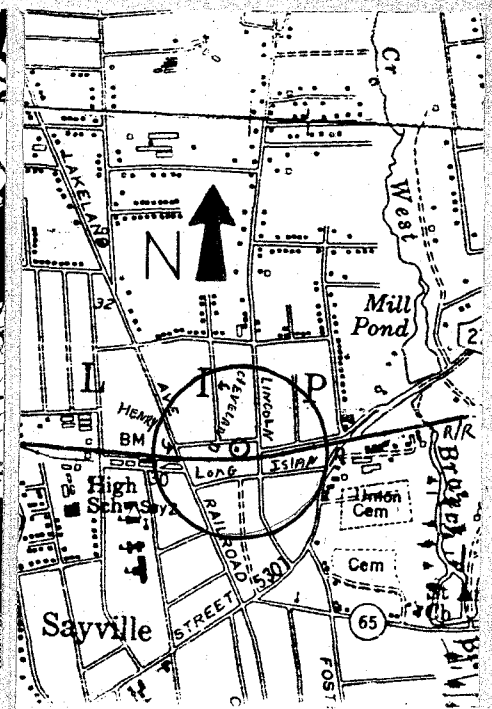

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

42 Henry Street is located on the south side of the road near the Long Island Rail Road tracks in a primarily residential area of houses that date from a variety of historic periods. This example is similiar in type to SY 8 and SY 9, located nearby on Lincoln Avenue.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

42 Henry Street is a 2½ story, L-shaped, three bay, side entrance plan, stucco house with pronounced masonry quoins. The semi-wrap around porch features Tuscan columns. 6/2 windows with 2/2 storm sash remain throughout the house. A yellow brick chimney marks the roof.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house appears to be of masonry. It was owned in 1915 by William Bason. Bason was a prominent local mason and builder. The house is unique and of considerable interest. The yellow brick chimney is a sophisticated touch, not surprising considering Mr. Bason's business.
