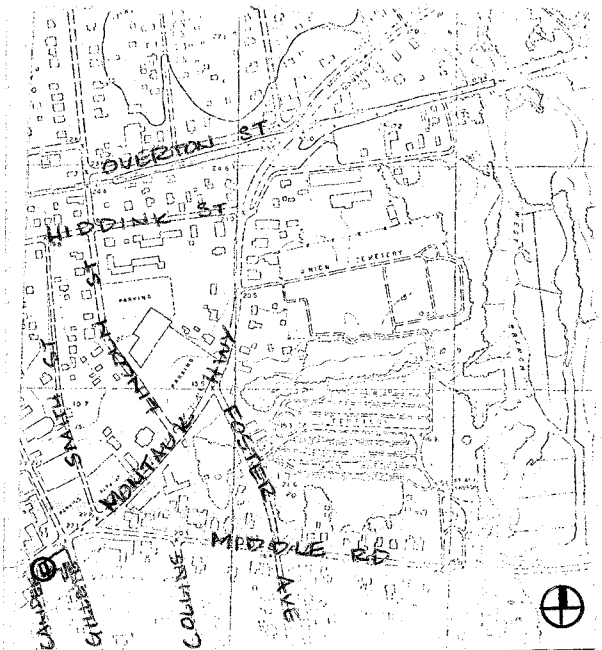

This building was owned by Joseph Wood in 1915, and adds to the ambiance of the historic Sayville Business District.

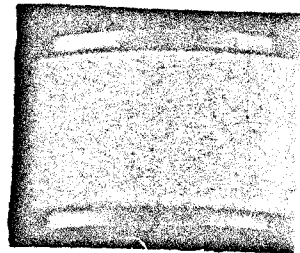

80 Years Ago

It was rumored that Joseph Wood intended to replace the little wooden building which stood at the corner of Main Street and Candee Avenue with a modern brick building. The wooden building had been partially destroyed by fire.

John Westerbeke Sr. had died at his West Sayville home aged 74 years. He had come to America from Holland 42 years before.

The West Sayville band had elected the following officers: Leader, Ira Ockers Jr.; Assistant, James King; Secretary, William Munkelwitz; Treasurer, Edward Munkelwitz; Trustees, William Van Wyen, Rulof Van Wyen and William Tucker.

70 Years Ago

The News said, "The telephone Company has completed its line along the North Road and now quite a good many new instruments are being installed."

The Holland Ladies Aid Society of West Sayville had held its annual meeting and election of officers at the home of Mrs. Nicholas Vander Borgh and had reelected the following officers: Mrs. William Tucker Sr., president; Mrs. T. Dykstra, vice president; Mrs. Nicholas Vander Borgh, secretary and treasurer.

60 Years Ago

The week had seen the first day since June 27 that not a single

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case of infantile paralysis had been reported in the county. There had been 55 deaths and several hundred were crippled. The quarantine had been lifted and schools were about to reopen.

Pvt. Frank Antos, who had been spending several months on the Mexican border, returned to his home here.

Stenger and Rohm had been granted the agency for Ford cars here.

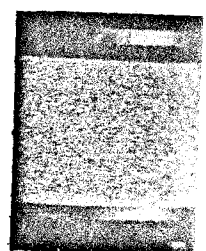
A concrete road was being laid across the meadows on South Main Street.

The News said, "Crap shooters, who have been unmolested in Sayville for some time past, have become bold and have had well established haunts where the sportily inclined youths of this and nearby towns could get a run for their money on Sunday afternoons and almost any evening.
