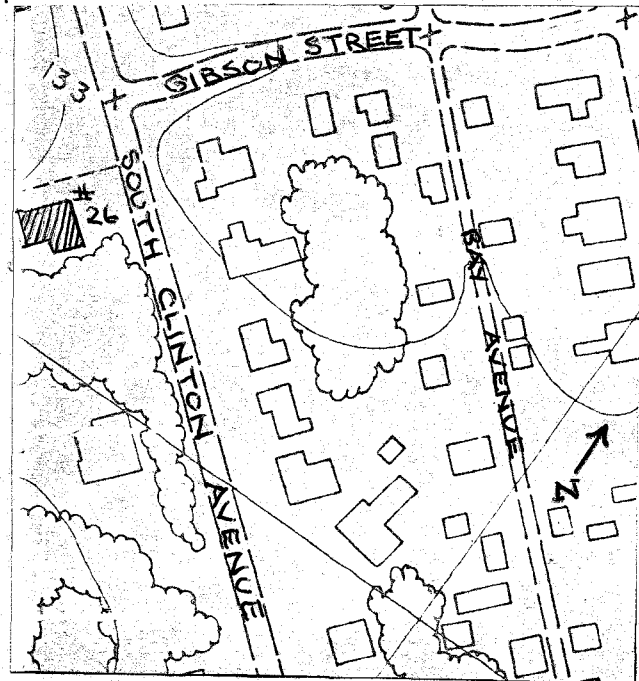

The house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, particularly those from the Victorian Era.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

The house has its original porte-cochere and porch. The porch has simple classical columns and extends to a polygonal pavilion on the south side. The columns of the porte-cochere rest on brick piers.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This shingled house is three bays wide and has a gambrel roof. There is a polygonal dormer with its original windows, the upper sash of which have either eight or twelve panes. The front door has diamond panes. The house's chimney is corbelled. The massing of the house is of particular interest, due to the gambrel roof, polygonal dormer, and first floor polygonal pavilion.
