#### 3. DESCRIPTION:

O Co'Nee is a low, flat peninsula west of the Bay Shore business district. It is bounded by Great South Bay on the south, Main Street (Montauk Highway) on the north, the Village of Brightwaters on the west, and Clinton Avenue on the east. O Co'Nee is divided by Lawrance Creek (also called Manatuck River) which is a creek extending from north of Montauk Highway to the Bay. Many of the houses in O Co'Nee have frontage on the creek or on the two canals, one on the east and one between Lawrance Lane and West Lane.

#### 4. SIGNIFICANCE:

O Co'Nee was originally part of the farm-estate of wealthy summer resident Frank C. Lawrance whose mansion and farm buildings were on the north side of Montauk Highway. (See form BS 53 and BS 53A.) During World War I Charles L. Lawrance (his son?) generously gave the government permission to use eight acres of the land at O Co'Nee for a seaplane and naval air base. The base was located on the bay at the end of what is now Garner Lane and was opened by the state in 1916. It was taken over by the regular Navy in June 1917 and ceased in 1920.

Charles L. Lawrance lived at Meadow Brook Farm in East Islip. He was the inventor of the Whirlwind airplane engine that carried Lindbergh across the Atlantic in 1927. As early as WW 1, Lawrance was working on the Whirlwind engine. "I think the first engine was dated 1919," wrote the Town Historian in 1980.

In 1920 a certificate of incorporation to develop the acreage was filed with the Suffolk County Clerk in Riverhead to establish the O Co'Nee Association, Inc., a membership corporation. Ample safeguards in the form of deed restrictions were placed upon the properties. It seems not unlikely that Garner Lane was named for Commodore Garner of the South Side Club, who lost his life in 1876 by the upsetting of his famous yacht Mohawk off Staten Island. Mr. John Lawrence was a relative and partner of Commodore Garner. Lawrence Lane, of course, is self explanatory, as is the name West Lane.


While the property was shown as F.C. Lawrance on the 1915 map, in 1920 the incorporation papers list C.L. Lawrance Corp. as "original owners." This development is unusual in the fact that it has one road laid out with large, oversize lots, (Garner Lane), a second with lots about half the size, (Lawrance Lane), and the furthest west with much smaller lots (West Lane).

The majority of the buildings that were built before WW II and are noteworthy for their architectural interest and for their excellent unaltered appearance (integrity) will be found on Garner Lane. Here, of the 35 properties, there are 14 significant structures. Only 7 significant buildings were found on Lawrance and West Lanes. In 1935 there were over sixty homes, and by 1974 there were 120. Of these 42 can be considered as significant.



shortly after the canal was opened. Mir. Lawrance was inventor of the Wright Whirlwind Motor.




