



The building is on the main commercial street. There are other structures of architectural significance near-by, though from varying periods and in varying styles. Many of them have under-
gone extensive remodelling.

This two story building is three bays wide and has a gable roof. The gables are on the side of the building, and the eaves expose extended rafter ends. The second floor windows have simply molded architraves.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
Despite alterations, this building retains some elements of an early twentieth century wood frame structure. It is one of the few gable roofed buildings with exposed rafter ends on Main Street.

It's business as usual along Bay Shore's Main Street today, just as it was in 1906 when the above picture was taken. But what a vast difference in the two scenes!


The leisurely pace of horse and wagon, of bicycles and those early hand-cranked cars, has
