17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: (Indicate if building or structure is in an historic district)

This building is on Main Street which is primarily commercial. It is just west of Southside Hospital. It is one of the few remaining residences on Main Street.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): This house retains much of its original detail - wide clapboards, pilastered corners, and square-posted porch. There is a similar building, said to have been built by the same people, on Oakland Avenue, across from Pennataquit Press; it was moved from the site of the present Medical Arts Building.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This residence is one of the few remaining architecturally significant houses on Main Street. It is one and one-half stories and has a gable roof. There is a four bay front porch with square posts. There is a projecting bay window to the left of the porch. The corners of the house are pilastered. There are five front second story windows three-over-3 casements. The front first story and east side windows are six-over-six and have slightly projecting triangular heads. The front door has four pane narrow sidelights. There is a one story wing on the west side. There are symmetrically placed chimneys at the sides of the main section.

Additional Information on Dr. Mary Holt House East Main Street, Bay Shore

This is considered to be one of the oldest houses in Bay Shore, circa 1810 - 1820. Previous to 1900 it was owned by Mr. Gibson, who had an upholstery and cabinet-making shop in the rear. After Mr. Gibson, the house was owned by the Mack Family, as is indicated in the 1915 E. Belcher Hyde Atlas.
