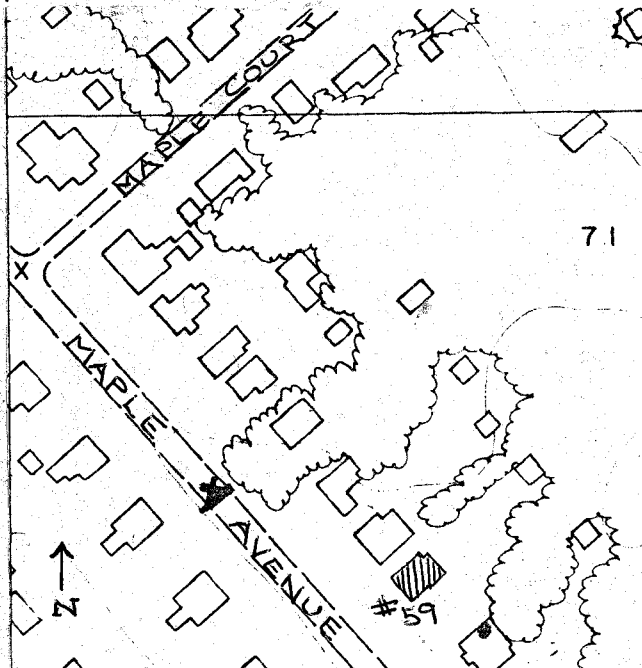

This shingled house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, ranging from Victorian to Shingle to Spanish Style.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

The house retains its original windows. There are two twelve-over-one windows at the south end of the front facade. The front gable has a nine-over-one window flanked by six lights on each side (two wide, three long). The north side has a round headed window with an ornamental design, and shingles outlining the circular head.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house has an unusual combination of gable and gambrel roof types, with a return on the gable side. The roof line is repeated on the large front dormer. There is a wide overhang. The front porch has classical columns and a simple balustrade. There are several types of original windows, the predominant type being rectangular with simple architraves. (the multi-paned types and round-headed window are described above) On the south side below the cornice there is a second story bay window. The front facade has a shed roof dormer.

This may have been the E.R. Udall House in 1915.
