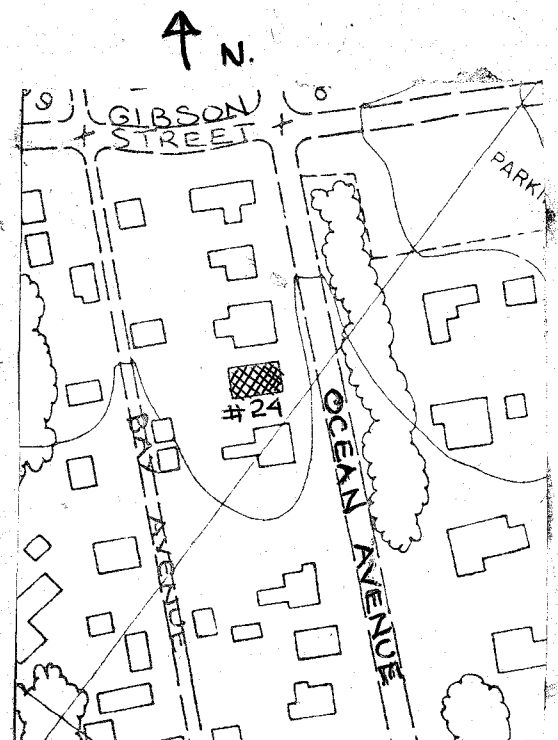
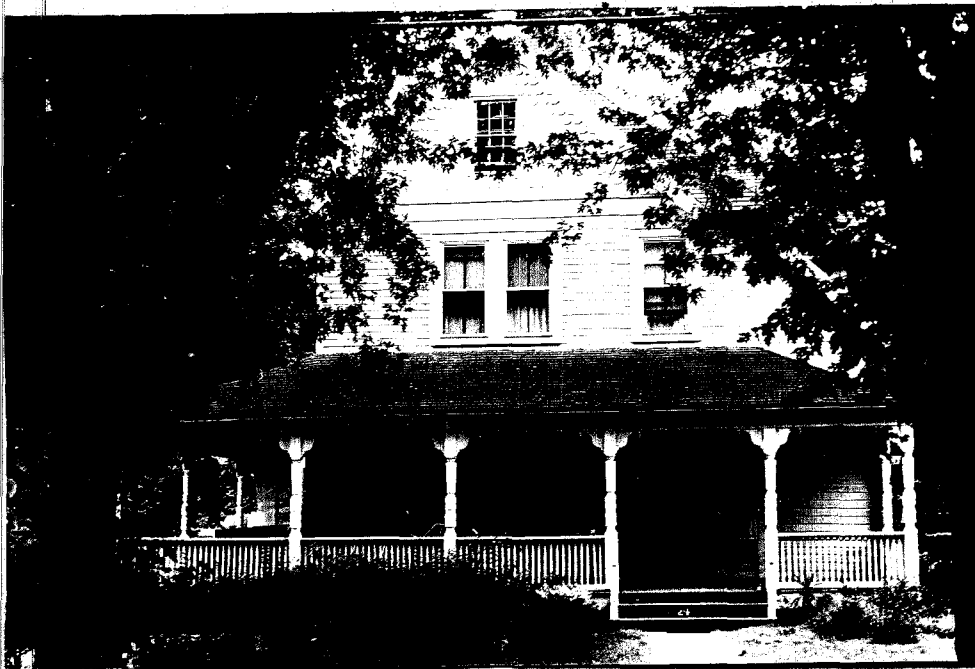

This house is in a residential area extending from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are many houses of Architectural significance in this area, particularly those from the Victorian Era in the Italianate and Queen Anne styles.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

This Victorian house has the typical contrasting surface materials - clapboard and variegated shingle. The porch, extending along the front and one side, is original with turned posts and drops. The side eaves expose decorative extended rafters. Windows are original.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house is a good example of the Victorian houses common in this area. It has a projecting side bay, mixed use of clapboard and clipped shingle, vergeboards, extended rafters, and original windows. The original windows are primarily two over two. The sidelights, flanking the front entrance, extend about two-thirds the length of the door and have a molded trim. The original porch with its turned posts and drops is typically Victorian.

There is a six over six window in the main gable.
