This house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, ranging from large Victorian and Colonial Revival houses to simple baymen's cottages.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): The front facade of this Italianate house has gabled sections flanking a square tower. There are large decorative brackets alternating with groups of three smaller and simpler brackets; the frieze is panelled. The front porch has square posts, simple balustrade, and original gingerbread.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This Italianate house retains its original detail, i.e., brackets, drops, windows, architraves, and porch, and square tower. The first floor has rectangular windows; the second floor segmental arched windows; and the tower's third floor pointed windows. The projecting window heads are bracketed; the sills have small rounded brackets. The front entryway is pilastered and bracketed; the door is doubleleafed. There is a projecting sweep of roof over the front entryway and first floor front window. The north and south sides have rectangular windows. The south side has a projecting bay with a bracketed roof, and a one bay side entrance porch with diagonal trelliswork, ogee arches, and brackets. This may be the J.B. Pullis house of 1915. 21.
