

There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, ranging from ornate Victorian houses to simple baymen's cottages.
18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known): This Dutch Colonial Revival House has a gambrel roof and three front dormers capped with overhanging, durved and pointed roofs. There are pointed panes in the upper sash of the dormer windows. There is a shed-roofed dormer with three diamond paned casements above the major dormers. The wing in the rear also has its original dormers.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: This house is a fine example of the Dutch Colonial Revival style. There is an original front porch and pedimented porte-cochere with wooden columns supported on brick piers. The back porch has a trellis. The north side has a projecting bay with brackets, and dormers. The upper sash of the north gable window has diamond-shaped panes. The north side's projecting bay has a casement window with pointed panes; there are diamond shaped shingles in the gable of this projecting bay. There is a small diamond-paned window below this bay. The south side has a projecting bay window: The porte-cochere has trelliswork. First floor windows are shuttered. The house's main section has a central chimney; the foundation is brick 21. SOURCES:
