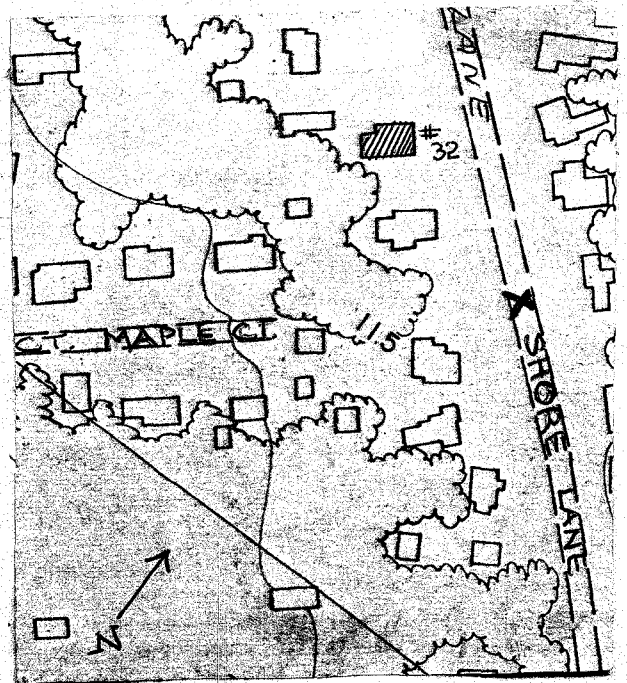

This house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, particularly from the Victorian Era - in the Italianate and Queen Anne styles.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
 This Queen Anne style house has its original porch with turned posts, balustrade and stickwork. The porch's pediment has stickwork, as do the lower gables on the north and south sides. On the north side there are flared shingles between the first and second stories. The house has cross gables.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This house has a variety of surface materials, characteristic of the Queen Anne style. There is a combination of pointed and clipped shingle in the main gable. Much of the house has rectangular shingles, while the first floor is clapboard. The original ornament is retained in the gables and the porch. The front gable's verges have an extended projection above the level of the gable windows. The north and south sides of the house have gabled projections.
