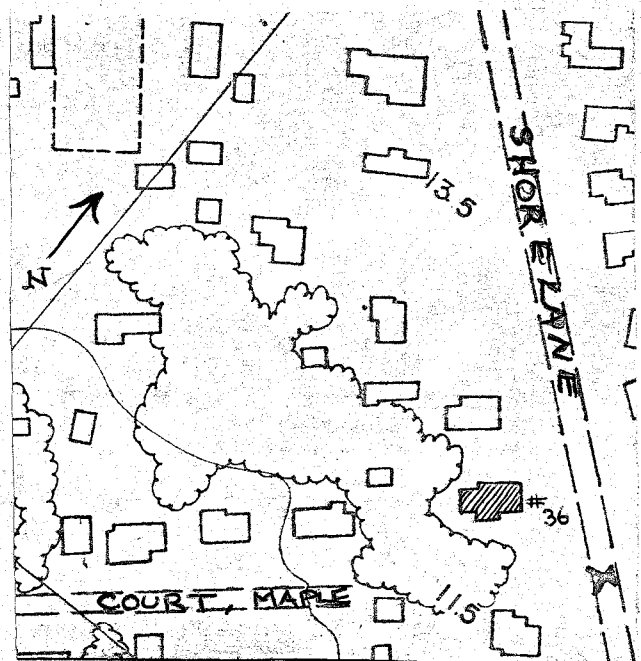

This house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, particularly from the Victorian Era, in the Queen Anne and Italianate styles.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
The dominant element of this Victorian house is its original porch. The porch extends along the front and around half the south side. It has round turned posts and jigsaw brackets. There are drops in the center of the porch's semi-elliptical arches. The porch eaves have brackets; the frieze is simply panelled.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This two and one-half story Victorian house is three bays wide; there is a wing on the south side. The original porch has brackets, drops, and turned posts on brick piers. The houses's windows are rectangular with simple architraves. There are pointed windows in the gables. The front door is double-leafed. The foundation is brick.
