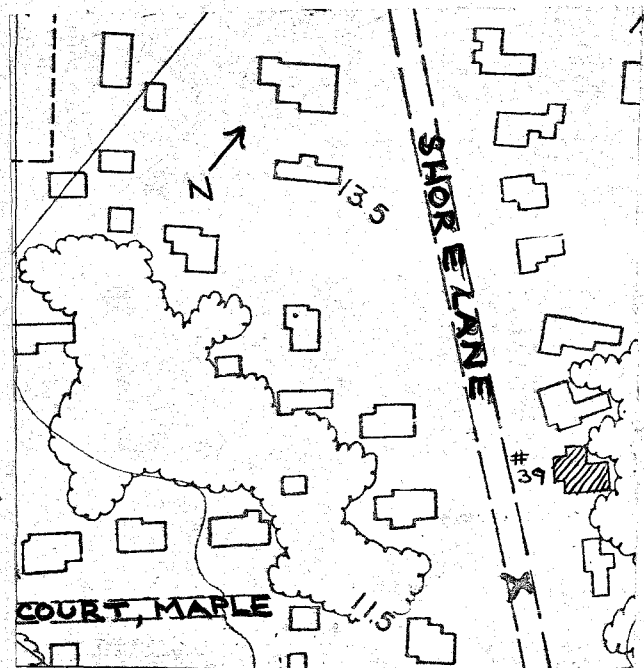

17. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS:

This house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, particularly from the Victorian Era, in the Queen Anne and Italianate styles.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
This two and one-half story shingled house is seven bays wide. The three bay central unit is gabled and projects forward. The extensive front porch has turned posts and a balustrade. The porch entrance is pedimented and has stickwork in the gables - front and sides. There are second story porches at either side of the central gabled section.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:
This two and one-half story house is a fine example of the Italianate style. The projecting central section is gabled with a return cornice; the eaves have heavy decorative brackets. The frieze is simple with a curving design at its ends. The rectangular windows have projecting heads with small brackets, and molded trim. The front porch has stickwork, turned posts, and a geometric balustrade. The second story porches flanking the projecting central unit, have simple balustrades. There is a corbelled center chimney.
