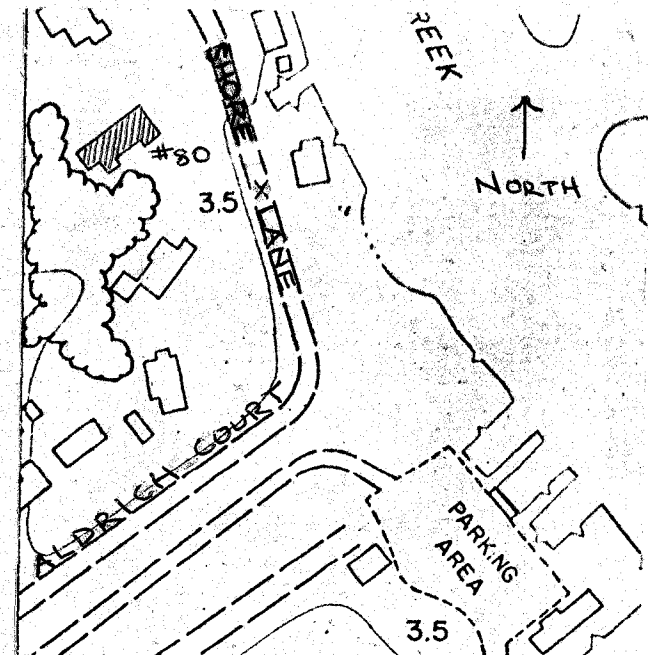

This house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, ranging from rural Greek Revival to formal Colonial Revival, with Victorian predominating.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):
This large two and one-half story Colonial Revival house is in unspoiled condition, retaining all its original detail. The three front dormers are gabled with return cornices; they have round headed windows with ornamental upper sash, and triangular casement side windows. The steep gabled roof has a return cornice as does the projecting wing.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This Colonial Revival house retains its original windows, porches, shutters, cornices with fretwork, balustrades, pilasters, etc. The two second story porches have Chippendale railings and urn-shaped finials on the newel posts. The gabled one bay front entrance porch has a return cornice, classical columns, pilasters, an ornamental semi-circular fanlight, sidelights, decorative molding and festoons. The first and second floors have rectangular windows. The east wing has a Palladian window with an ornamental design in the upper sash. There is another Palladian window in the rear over a projecting semi-circular entrance porch with railing above. The main section's east gable has an ornamented circular window. The rear has shed roof dormers.
