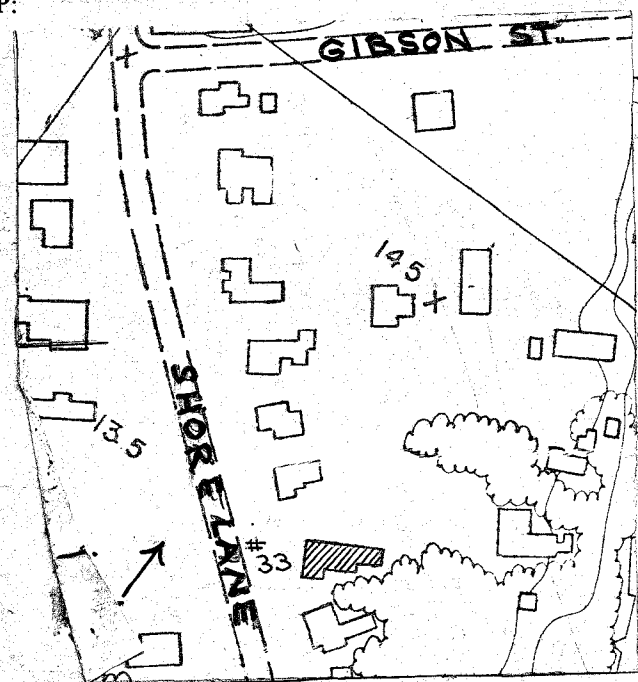

This house is in a residential area which runs south from Main Street to the Great South Bay. There are numerous houses of architectural significance in the area, particularly from the Victorian Era, in the Queen Anne and Italianate styles.

18. OTHER NOTABLE FEATURES OF BUILDING AND SITE (including interior features if known):

This two and one-half story Victorian house has much of its original detail. The roof line retains decorative brackets, dentils, and frieze. The porch has turned posts with scrollwork, and a simple balustrade. There are dentils at the window heads. The gable windows are pointed. The foundation is brick.

20. HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE:

This is a fine example of a Victorian house with much of its original detail, i.e. brackets, dentils, frieze, turned posts and scrollwork. The building is cross gabled; there is a projecting bay window on the north side, with a rectangular projection above it. The front door has a transom and sidelights. The windows, other than the gable windows, are rectangular with dentils at the heads. The first floor front windows reach almost to the floor level.
