




and only eight of its kind exist as historical landmarks on Long Island. Students initiate restoration, and upkeep of the structure. Pride and a sense of dignity is in the hands of the students, and a landmark is kept in the Brentwood Community.

Construction for a new Pathmark shopping center on 50,000 square feet of commercial property, will not begin until next year. Meanwhile, it's still a residential community, which must relocate at least 20 families from the proposed area. The residents are letting their complaints be heard, though the development seems apparent. The proposal is near the corner's of Suffolk Avenue and Fifth Avenue in Brentwood.

On Tuesday, 21st, during Public Hearings at Islip's Town Hall, resident's were heard. One home-owner, Robert Williams, 10 Wicks Road; Brentwood, believes his family isn't getting 'Fair Market Value' of their home. Also, he, as well as other area residents, feel that \$5,000, by commercial developer, Jerry Stolse, isn't enough for moving expenses. Some monies might be assessed for worth, still others may lose out overall. Although, if their cases are brought before a court, they could decide on the best alternative, according to Supervisor Frank R. Jones.

For convenience of patrons, a vote passed, giving banking customers more access to their money. An automatic Banking Machine will be located in the near future, at the southest corner, on the main floor, of the Long Island Mac Arthur Airport for five years, with a five year option agreement, with the airport.

tage, minimum 3%, and not to exceed 9%, using 1989 as the base rent year. While the CPI increase will prevail during the option period.

Tenants of the Islip Grange, Bernard and Denise Smallwood, have been given an extended stay until January 31, 1989. The Town of Islip, owns the property which is also known as the "Robinson House", located on Broadway Avenue, Sayville, New York. The Town will receive \$600 per month rent, along with services from the Smallwoods.

The tenants have assisted the Town in renovation, and interior design, to its original stake circa 1830. They are highly qualified by education and knowledge in history, and are willing to continue to live on the premise.

A privately owned dock and marina, on the south shore lands of Fire Island, east by the Atlantic Ocean, and west by Ocean Beach. in the confines of Islip township will serve, seasonally, for recreational purposes. It's capable of holding 54 boat slips. Dock space is considered for residents of other counties, by day, but can't keep their boats there at night. The reason: Fire Island citizens have ownership. They pay Fire Island taxes for the marina, on the establishment of Seaview Park and Harbor District, Fire Island.

Youth Development Programs in Bay Shore, Central Islip, and Brentwood have been granted additional funding by the Town of Islip. The \$80,000.00 in Suffolk County funds, will be dispersed, as follows: \$28,000.00 for Bay Shore CCY; \$26,000.00 for Central Islip YDC, and \$26,000.00 for Brentwood YDC.

ular Day Instruction Program" represents approximately 50% of the total budget and details the costs of educating such as teachers, fringe benefits and classroom materials and supplies. The total proposed budget, all parts, currently reflects a 7.29% or \$3.1 million increase over last year with budget talks still in progress for anticipated changes to reflect an overall increase of only 7%. And with this Dr. Bernhard announced that the summer school program for 1989 will be eliminated (as was done in 1988) because it cannot be afforded. 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

LONG ISLAND FORUM



THE VILLAGE of Brentwood (sometimes called Brentwoodin-the-Pines) has an interesting story behind it. It is however, a short story compared to those of many other communities on the island. Little over a century ago, this village in the northerly part of Islip town was an unidentified section of the scruboak belt. It wasn't until 1842, with the main line of the LIRR completed that far out from Jamaica, that a station was erected, not at the site of Brentwood, but some distance to the west. Called Thompson's Station, it served such nearby communities as Smithtown, Hauppauge, Central Islip and several south side villages. It was also the nearest rail stop for city sportsmen who patronized Liff Snedecor's hunting and fishing lodge at Great River and Liff ran his own stage to and from the station over the sandy, and sometimes snowy roads between. The same-service was continued, with Liff's son Obie doing the driving, after Liff sold the lodge and its 1100 acres of woodland to the newly organized South Side Club.

A little settlement naturally sprang up around Thompson's Station and in 1849 a

U.S. post office was established there. The following year Josiah Warren and Stephen Pearl Andrews purchased several hundred acres in what was some day to become Brentwood, and within the next few years founded a community of families whose adult members subscribed to the political and social doctrines which Messrs. Warren and Andrews preached. They called the place Modern Times. Warren was the sparkplug of the movement which, far from the teachings of Karl Marx as some writers have reported, emphasized "the sovereignty of the individual." 1850

Warren built an\_octagonal structure as the center of activities. Here was located the seat of local government which was Warren himself. Also housed in the building were Warren's general store, Warren's printing plant, his community weekly, and a school, of which Warren was the sole instructor. Using the printing plant to good advantage, he circularized the living advantages of Modern Times throughout state and nation and the place grew by leaps and bounds.

Meanwhile, the tract was

subdivided and zoned and a highway system laid out with the main thoroughfares converging upon Warren's eightsided building. In 1856 when the town established a school district to include the area. a primary school was established with Miss Eleanor Blacker as teacher.

During the early years of the community, homeowners had difficulty in obtaining water. The only available supply had to be toted in buckets from the farm of Dr. Edgar See F. Peck which lay outside the area. Warren finally call-ed a public meeting to solve this problem and as a result a community well was sunk conveniently close to most homes. This led to some householders acquiring horses and cows. Thereafter a community manure pile was started and this in turn led to a boom in gardening. Among the inhabitants of the place before 1860 was Charles A. Codman, an experienced farmer. Brothers William and John Metcalf joined in building a home and with them lived two sisters and a Mrs. Hayward. One Henry Edgar turned his home for turned into a meeting place for the Positivist Society which he founded. (Continued on page 141)



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
