



No provision is made for recreational facilities such as bathing, picnicking, ball fields or play-ground areas, but Heckscher State Park, located near Connetquot River State Park Preserve provides accommodations for active recreation.

HORSEBACK RIDING - CONNETQUOT RIVER STATE PARK PRESERVE INFORMATION, CONDITIONS & APPLICATIONS

1. Permit and identification must be carried by <u>each</u> rider while in the Preserve. Annual permits available at administration offices near the Sunrise Highway entrance. Annual fee \$10.00. Riders without a valid annual permit must obtain a daily use permit. Daily fee will be charged.

- Access to bridle paths at areas shown on map. Riding limited to defined trails. Horses should be ridden at walk, trot or canter only. Meet or pass other horses, vehicles or pedestrians in single file at a walk. Ride horses on road edges where possible. No loose livestock or dogs.
- 3. Avoid paths, streams, fishing sites and platforms, wet or marshy areas, maintenance areas and building complexes.
- 4. Smoking prohibited.
- 5. Horses must be properly saddled and bridled. Riding double prohibited. Horses with known vices such as biting, kicking, etc., will be identified by the traditional custom of a small RED ribbon on the tail. Unruly horses, reckless riding or violation of these rules may result in loss of riding permit.
- 6. Preserve closes at sunset. In travel to and from Preserve, observe traffic regulations and use caution at all road crossings and traffic signals.
- 7. The State of New York, Long Island State Park & Recreation Commission will not be responsible for injury to horse or rider.

Release your fish in the water, immediately, with care, and in the same condition it was taken. **NO** injured fish are to be released.

Fishing must be done with conventional fly fishing equipment limited to flies, fly rods, fly reels, and fly line with unweighted leader material attached. Any other type of fishing tackle is prohibited. Artificial flies and streamers are defined as being constructed of natural or synthetic materials, so long as all flies are constructed in a normal fashion on a single barbless hook with components wound on or about the hook. Specifically prohibited are molded facsimiles or replicas of insects, earthworms, fish eggs, fish or any invertebrate or vertebrate either singly or in combination with other materials. Likewise prohibited are other lures commonly described as spinners, spoons, or plugs made of metal, plastic, wood, rubber or like substances or combination thereof. To protect the environment, no lead weight, split shot or other lead items may be used.

The use or possession of any bait, fish eggs or fish parts and use of barbed hooks or any other fishing device other than barbless hooks, artificial flies or streamers is prohibited.

Please do not litter. Kindly carry out everything you have brought in - paper, fishing gear, etc.

Prevent forest fires, NO SMOKING in woodlands.

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
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

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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IT known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The 3528 acres in the Southside Sportsmens Club District has continuously provided the setting and wildlife that generated the sportsmen's gatherings at Snedicor's Inn and later the club. The property forms a corridor-like tract along the Connetquot River and contains a variety of natural features including marshes, woodlands, ponds, and brooks. Hatcheries, foot paths, bridges, blinds, and a dam evidence man's utilization of these natural resources. The buildings themselves are clustered near the southernmost end of the property immediately east of the dam which manipulates the Connetquot River into "Lower Pond" and "Main Pond."

The earliest known view of Snedicor's Inn suggests that, the original structure was a 'small, simple, gable-roofed building. The date of construction is unknown although between tradition and the earliest written documentation it appears that Snedicor first constructed his dwelling/inn between the 1820s and 1836.<sup>1</sup> Still to be determined, too, is the date at which Snedicor enlarged his establishment to the three-story structure depicted in a photograph dated ca. 1870.

Contained today within the north end of the clubhouse structure, Snedicor's Inn when acquired by the Southside Sportsmens Club, stood three stories high and seven bays long, covered by a gable roof and served by two interior chimneys, one at the north end, and one two bays from the south wall. A twostory covered veranda ran the length of the east (front) elevation and at the north end one, two bays from the south wall. A two-story, covered veranda ran the length of the east (front) elevation and at the north end stood a one-and-a-half story extension. Soon after the Club assumed title to the property both the upper story of the veranda and the north wing were removed.

The Club members subsequently erected a small extention at the south end of the inn which served as the main entrance and housed the bar. When originally constructed this wing did not stand flush with the front (east) wall of the main structure. 'In approximately the same period the club enlarged its facilities by erecting a three-bay by four-bay, two-and-a-half story frame wing at the south end to contain the Billiard Room.

In 1886, under the supervision of a four-member committee which included Bayrad Cutting, the Billiard Room Wing was moved approximately twenty-five feet southward and the portion of the clubhouse situated between that wing and Snedicors was substantially enlarged. Authorized in 1885, the improvement was completed, according to plans drawn by Bradford L. Gilbert, two years later at a cost of more than \$15,000. This enlargement provided the present dining room, rod room, stairs, superintendents quarters, and several additional bedrooms. In SEE CONTINUATION SHEET. m

During these alterations the clubhouse in its entirety was shingled. As the Executive Committee reported:

> This was not altogether done to please the eye, as the tarred paper with the shingles, make the Old Club House a warm and comfortable building during the winter and spring months.<sup>2</sup>

Thirty-three years later the interior of the upper floors in the old section of the clubhouse was rebuilt in order to reinforce the old framing system which had been disturbed by alterations made since Snedicor's retirement. Other alterations undertaken at this time included removal of the steps which had led to the piazza for its entire length, and the construction of a shorter stretch of stairs and of a porte-cochere by builders from New York City. In 1904 the Club contracted with Ashby and Breck enridge of Bayport who constructed a new gun room behind the rod room.<sup>3</sup>

As it stands today the main clubhouse is a substantial wood frame structure measuring sixteen bays in length, from three to four bays in width, and varying from two to three-and-a-half stories in height. Old Snedicor's Inn, as it appeared ca 1870 is still clearly discernible for it forms the north end of the structure. Similarly the Billiard Room Wing, distinguished by its low-sloped bracketed cross-gables, is unaltered in mass and forms the southern end of the structure. The intervening block attains the greatest height, three and a half stories, and is easily distinguished by the paired gables which constitute its roof, the bracketed overhan'g at the second floor level, and a one-bay, two-story, gabled extension which projects over the main entrance.

The interior is striking for the degree to which the integrity of the ca. 1870-1900 sportsmens gathering place has been retained, especially in the 1st floor of the Billiard Room Wing and of the central block. Measuring 29' by 35' with no interior supports, the Billiard Room itself contains the dado, paneled doors, simple window enframements, and the furnishings depicted in ca. 1870's engravings and photographs. The Franklin Stove came from an Astor home and the lockers from Harry Felter's billiard room on Broadway in New York City. Distinctive, too, are the Wainscoted walls of the hallway, and the woodwork and furnishings of the rod room.

East of the Clubhouse, at the west end of the dam stands a mid-18th century grist mill. Comprised of a hand-hewn wood frame, sheathed with shingles, the small gable-roofed mill was built so as to extend out over the water by resting the southern end upon SEE CONTINUATION SHEET.

three stone and brick piers. Fenestration is irregular. On the north end a small gabled extension has been constructed. An article in the Suffolk County News in 1898 indicates that despite extensive alterations planned for the clubhouse, "the old mill, an ancient landmark, will remain undisturbed."<sup>5</sup> Like the exterior, the interior is essentially unaltered and still contains some milling equipment.

In addition to enlargement of the clubhouse itself, the club facilities were expanded by the construction of two annexes which stand south (1879) and north (1903) of the main structure. Both are shingled, wood-frame, hip-roofed buildings which provided additional bedrooms and suites for members. The south annex measures four by five bays and stands two stories high. A local newspaper reported the plans for the north annex as follows:

> Eight wealthy members of the Southside Sportsmens Club have joined in an agreement to build a house on the club grounds close to the main building for their private use. It is to consist of eight commodious bedrooms with private bathroom for the individual use of these members. Plans for a very luxurious appointed building have been drawn by architect...Green jr., and the contract to build it was awarded to Ashby and Breckenridge of Bayport... No facts have been made public but the building will probably cost between \$15,000 and \$20,000.6

The edifice, erected on the site of the miller's house, was designed in the colonial revival style. Its nine-bay front (southeast) elevation is dominated by a slightly projecting central pavilion crowned by a pedimental cross-gable.

There are, in addition, three other dependencies and an archeological site in the immediate vicinity. Across the mill-tail once stood the dwelling of Steve Murray, a guide long associated with the club. Immediately southwest of the mill there is a small, cross-gabled, frame pump house, and to the rear of the clubhouse itself are a very long two-story shingled frame Barn, and a substantial, gable-roofed, brick and frame Ice House.

An unusual survival of both architectural and environmental resources, the Southside Sportsmens Club District is a well-preserved illustration of one phase of Long Island's Social history especially characteristic of the last half of the 19th century. In addition, it is a landmark in the settlement of Islip for the wealthy entrepreneurs who patronized Snedicor's Inn and later formed the club built the large neighboring estates which historically and architecturally have characterized a significant portion of Islip's development.

Eliphalet Snedicor (1789-1861) is said to have moved from a site on the Old Plank Road in Jamaica, where he operated an inn for hunters and fishermen, to Islip where he resumed business as early as the <u>1820</u>s on land leased from William Nicoll, original grantee of Islip. Situated on South Country Road, a stage route from New York City, Snedicor's Inn enjoyed substantial popularity among travelers and sportsmen--a tradition certainly in part substantiated by Philip Hone's observations in 1836:

> We went to Snedicor's after dinner where we found the house so full that if we had not taken the precaution to write in advance for beds, we might have lain on the floor.<sup>1</sup>

In addition to accomodating travelers and sportsmen from New York City, the inn served as a social and political gathering place for Islip. Town records indicate that from as early as 1838 Town Board Meetings were held regularly at Snedicor's.

When the Snedicor family retired in 1866, one hundred of Snedicor's customers formed the Southside Sportsmens Club and purchased the property. At \$500 per share, corporate stock totaled \$50,000. Often described by contemporaries as "solid men from prominent business families in New York City,"<sup>2</sup> the membership has continuously included many of the wealthy and eminent men of 19th century as well as . 20th Century New York: Charles Tiffany (a charter member), John Rogers, John J. Hackett (N.Y.S. Supreme Court), George G. Bernard (N.Y.S. Supreme Court), George Lorillard, William K. Vanderbilt, W. H. Wickham SEE CONTINUATION SHEET

(Mayor of New York City, 1874), August Belmont, H. B. Hyde, George Robeson (Secretary of the Navy), Roland Redmond, F.B. Bourne (Singer Sewing Machine Co.), W. Bayard Cutting, and Theodore Roosevelt.<sup>3</sup> Many of these men came to Islip as members of the club and subsequently built large estates in the immediate neighborhood of which several remain: Dowling College and several other establishments (originally Vanderbilt's "Idle Hour"), La Salle Military Academy (Bourne), Bayard Cutting Arboretum (Cutting), and Southward Ho Country Club (Hyde).

The Southside Sportsmens Club has functioned continuously up to 1973 and, due to sympathetic treatment, today constitutes a total environment of architectural and natural resources predominantly representative of the last quarter of the 19th century. On the acreage encompassed by this district an ecological equilibrium has been preserved as it existed prior to the suburbanization of Long Island, and constitutes, as well, an illustration of the art and science of environmental management for over 100 years. The complex of structures situated thereon is significant for the survival of the unit in tact, and for the architectural quality and integrity of the individual structures. The 18th century mill alone is a notable and well-preserved example of vernacular architecture, while the shingled clubhouse structures represent the sophisticated architecture of their day, executed with the simplicity befitting a sportsmen's lodge. The continuity of materials, construction techniques and building types, and the respect for natural materials inherent in the club's operations are significant expressions of a human respect for the land. Thus, despite the importance of the buildings themselves, the special vitality of this site derives from the inter-relationship of these wellpreserved structures and the land upon which they were erected.




Neg. KK XXIV-7, fm. NE. Main building showing north end.

History and Significance: In the early 19th century the tavern was an important stage stop; near by is an early wooden mile post. Fortunately the highway has been moved.

Inside the club house is an 1883 photo showing the tavern and recently built billiard section as clapboard buildings. In the 1890 the connecting section between the tavern and buildi billiard section was raised to 2 storied and Tudorised in the familliar turn of the century opulence. Later the entire building was covered in wooden shingles to give unity to the 3 sections. Very little of the tavern as been tampered with and the interior is largely intact.

From 1866 on, the period when it cersed to be a tavern on South Country Rd. and became a Sportsmans club, numerous notables the tavern has been visited by numbrous presidents and not other notables - Grover Cleveland, U. S. Grant, T. Rosevelt, Adlas Stevenson, John Mc clung, C. R. Smith, and a number of wealthy New Yorkers, etc.

Although the architecture of the present structure is not outstanding, it is by no means objectionable. A restored 1900 type sportsman's club emulating the wealth of turn of the century L. 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Snedecor Tavern-Southside Sportsmen's Hunting Lodge

The original clapboard tavern in Federal style dates from c 1820. Sometime before 1883 another clapboard section (the billiard room) was added. In the 1890's, the portion connecting the two sections was raised to three stories. Later, the entire structure was shingled. Although the early tavern was not tampered with and its interior is largely intact, the overall effect of the large front resembles an example of the turn-of-the-century Tudor Revival country-estate.

In the early 19th century, the tavern was an important stage stop. After is ceased to be a tavern in 1866, it became a sportsmen's club. Wealthy and prominent persons in the late 19th century made the club a gentlemen's resort and used it as a base for fishing and small game hunting. U. S. Grant, Grover Cleveland, Theodore Roosevelt as well as a number of leaders of industry and finance were members or were guests of the club.

The hunting lodge is a rapidly disappearing feature of recreational activity and social history. This site, with the adjacent mill, should be preserved, restored and interpreted to indicate its significance. Registration would assist in providing the necessary recognition.
