

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It's Their Converted Church

The Main Street home of Charles and Dot Peppard was once the first Dutch Reformed Church of West Sayville, built in 1867. And although they have always known that their house has a unique history, the Peppards today are busy boning up on the past because the Town of Islip plans to build a three-quarter scale replica of the old church at Islip Grange.

Planning Commissioner Michael LoGrande explained that the scheduled November 30 completion of the smaller, but no less authentic reproduction of the old church will mark the end of the Town's current plans for its village of historic buildings. Located Broadway Park in Sayville, Islip Grange has taken two years to complete at a modest cost of \$150,000.

According to Dot Peppard,

the congregation used the old Dutch Reformed Church for 41 years before deciding to construct a new building on Cherry Street. Her father-in-law, Charles Peppard Sr., bought the old building in 1919.

"That leaves us with a nine year gap", Dot laughed, "which we know nothing about. We're right in the middle of trying to fill in these missing years, as the information will be useful for the Town architect who was here last week taking measurements and surveys. Charles' mother is still alive, so we're asking her to remember all she can about the house."

After Charles Sr. acquired the old church building, he moved it to its present location next to Montauk. Highway and raised it on a cement block to ac-


commodate the horse-drawn moving vans of the era. The building had been divided into a two-family house by the time it came into the Peppards' possession.

"Basically, we live in the actual shell of a building constructed in 1867", Dot noted. "The original beams are still in the attic. All the family did was install heating, as the original church had none."

Dot added that the huge church windows were gone when the Peppards bought the building, as was the belfrey. "No one", she said, "knows what happened to the belfrey. It's a real mystery."

According to Commissioner LoGrande, the Town will also omit the heating when it builds the scaled replica. "We'll

Cakdale is a name given, two or three years since, to the locality extending along and near the south "country road" from the Conetquot River eastward for a distance of two miles or more. It has a station on the South Side Railroad, and since the completion of that road a post-office has been established here. It contains one church, a store, a district school, and about forty dwellings, mostly scattered along the main road and upon a lane which runs down towards the bay. Near the residence of W. H. Ludlow, Esq., stands St. John's Episcopal church, the first house of worship crected within the limits of this town. This was built by the third William Nicolls, about ten years before the Revolution. Historians differ as to the exact date. The church stands in the midst of an ancient burying ground. In 1843 it was re-built, and consecrated by the bishop, July 6th of that year.

The eastern boundary of Oakdale appears indefinite. If we place it at Greene's Brook, which seems to be the only suitable natural line, we must include another church. That is the Dutch Reform church, organized Dec. 19, 1866. The building, which stands a little west of Greene's Brook, is neat in appearance, of comfortable size, and was dedicated Nov. 11, 1867.

Sayville is a thriving village of one thousand population, pleasantly situated near the bay, immediately east of Oakdale. The railroad station in the northern part is two and a quarter miles east of the latter point, and fifty miles from Brooklyn. There are three large general stores in the place, besides a number of shops. Ship-building and repairing is
